The Rules of the Paragraph

1) What is a paragraph?

A paragraph is a connected series of sentences that all concern a *single* topic.

A paragraph answers a question. (Even if just what happens next).

A paragraph stands almost completely on its own as a **developed thought**.

Most nonfiction paragraphs make and demonstrate a particular point.

Most nonfiction paragraphs are constructed around demonstrable facts.

2) What is an effective paragraph?

An effective paragraph is focused on a particular thought or expression or point.

An effective paragraph is organized in a logical pattern.

An effective paragraph is led by a strong and clear topic sentence.

An effective paragraph has a style that makes it stronger than the sum of its details.

3) Why is the topic sentence so important?

A topic sentence tells the reader the point of the paragraph.

A topic sentence summarizes the data contained within the paragraph.

4) What kinds of data?

Raw numbers or statistics

Apocryphal examples

Descriptions

Quotations

Any fact that shows causation

Any fact that shows the effects of an action

Any fact that deepens a description or reveals a character

Any fact that shows change over time

Any fact that demonstrates the veracity of a claim

5) How do I transform data points to sentences?

Start with a subject, usually a human, figure out who did the thing that you need to explain. Better a weak acting subject - "government officials" - than passive voice.

Figure out the action that your human subject did. Pick the best verb.

Only after figuring the who and the what, should you put your fingers on a keyboard.

Build out your subject-verb with appropriate detail.

Put your sentences in an logical order that best makes your point.

6) Write your topic sentence - and summarize the data of the paragraph

7) Read the graf through aloud and make sure it "sounds right"
